International Women's Day

In celebration of International Women's Day, March 8, Daphne Sequeira rscj was invited by the Jesuits to write an article for International Women's Day and to pose challenges that they need to consider as they collaborate with women.

Daphne listed some issues in the process of empowering women that the Jesuits need to give attention to in order to help bring a paradigm shift in the Church.

- Often in partnering, the sense of ownership remains non-negotiable. Consequently the center of a women's empowerment program remains man-centered. Initiatives involving women's empowerment need to have inbuilt, liberating structures leading to mutuality and reciprocity. This would provide equality and dignity in the collaboration.
- Another power imbalance happens when men are managers and women remain implementers of the programs. Women need to take the lead in initiating women's programs. The real success of empowerment is when the power is transferred to the hands of those who are being empowered.
- Often women's skills are used in the Church, both locally and globally, but they are not included in the thinking and shaping of the programs and policies. It is an urgent need for the Church structure to become more inclusive and give back to women the space that belongs to women. The Jesuits can play an important leading role in bringing justice and collaborating with women to contribute their might in the Church.

The 59th session of the Commission for Social Development (CSocD59) took place from February 8 -17, 2021. The priority theme of CSocD59 was "Socially-just transition towards sustainable development: The role of digital technologies on social development and well-being of all."
